

#MIXITUPSCARF

mix it up scarf



♥ LARGE AND FLUFFY SCARF WORKED IN COMFY FRAYA IN TWO COLOURS. IF YOU HAVE FELT TEMPTED TO TRY OUT SLIPPED STITCH PATTERNS, THIS PROJECT IS A GOOD PLACE TO START, SINCE THE PATTERN IS MADE UP OF NEARLY IDENTICAL ROWS. THIS MEANS THERE IS A LOT OF REPETITION WITH ONLY SLIGHT CHANGES – BUT WITH STUNNING RESULTS. A SCARF FOR THE BOLD INTERMEDIATE KNITTER – YOU’VE GOT THIS!

ABBREVIATIONS:

st[s] = stitch[es]**k** = knit**p** = purl**RS** = right side**WS** = wrong side**sl** = slip stitch(es) purl-wise**wyib** = with the yarn held to the back of the work**wyif** = with the yarn held to the front of the work

Cast on 43 sts UK size 2 [7 mm] needles with colour 1 and work in rib as follows:

WS rows: Sl1 wyif, p1, *k1, p1*, repeat from * to * to the last 3 sts, k1, p2.

RS rows: Sl1 wyib, k1, *p1, k1*, repeat from * to * to the last 3 sts, p1, k2.

Repeat until the rib measures 5 cm, ending on a WS row,

Begin the slipped stitch pattern on a RS row.

Change to colour 2 and UK size 0 [8 mm]:

Row 1: K1, *sl1 wyib, k1*, repeat from * to * to end of row.

Row 2: Sl1 wyif, purl to end of row.

Rows 3-4: Change to colour 1 and work as Rows 1-2.

Change to colour 2 and work as follows:

Row 5: K2, *sl1 wyib, k1*, repeat from * to * to the last stitch, k1.

Row 6: Sl1 wyif, purl to end of row.

Rows 7-8: Change to colour 1 and work as Rows 5-6.

Repeat Rows 1-8 until the work measures approx. 200 cm; then work in rib as at the top of the scarf. Bind off loosely, when the rib measures 5 cm.

Weave in all ends and lightly press the finished work.

MEASUREMENTS

30 cm x 200 cm

YARN

Comfy Fraya

50% wool, 40% acrylic, 10% alpaca

50 g = 80 m

YARDAGE

Colour 1: 200 g

Colour 2: 200 g

GAUGE

In pattern in UK size 0 [8 mm]

needles:

11 sts x 15 rows = 10 cm x 10 cm.

SUGGESTED NEEDLE SIZE

Circular needles UK size 2 [7 mm]

and 0 [8 mm]

Please note: The needle sizes given above are only suggestions. The size of the needles you need depends on your personal gauge. If you knit firmly you might need a large needle size, if you knit loosely you might need a smaller needle size.
